# **Leadership Rules on Rules**

Last week the House adopted its final procedural rules for the current session. There's no news there; it is not uncommon for the rules to be finalized after the start of session. But, this year, a group of Republican members in House Rules, led by Rep. John Blust (Guilford-R), attempted to lead a bit of a coup. The group tried to block conference committee members from adding provisions to a final conference report that were not part of the House- or Senate-approved versions of the bill. This was a standard rule in the past, but leadership has become accustomed to having the flexibility to put anything into a conference report. It makes negotiations between House and Senate leadership at the end of session easier and allows House leadership to act independently of its own caucus. After Blust's amendment initially passed, House leadership put the hammer down, reconsidering and stripping the amendment from the bill.

### **Doubts on Parks**

Last week, DENR Chief Operating Officer John Evans spoke to legislators about the administration's proposal to move the state parks, NC Zoo, Museum of Natural Science and the aquariums from DENR to the Department of Cultural Resources. The rationale given for the move was that Cultural Resources is better at raising money off state assets. This dovetails with another McCrory priority – something called "dynamic pricing," which allows flexible pricing based on season, special events and other marketing strategies.

Legislators had lots of questions. Freshman Rep. Brian Turner (Buncombe-D) noted that he has participated in business mergers, and "sometimes they work and sometimes they don't;" and asked when legislators would see additional details on efficiencies and savings. Rep. McElraft (Carteret-R) handed a long list of questions to Evans, and said she's been troubled by the decline in funding for state parks; she'd like to see the Governor ask for a restoration of the parks dedicated funding source (turned into a yearly appropriation in the 2013-2014 biennium).
